Shinagawa City Walking Map ~ My Leisurely Stroll No. 4

Ebara Shichifukujin Course

In this month's issue, "Shinagawa City Walking Map ~ My Leisurely Stroll" spotlights a New Year's tradition known as shichifukujin meguri (visiting the Seven Lucky Gods). According to legend, visiting the gods that bring seven types of happiness at the beginning of the New Year helps you avoid disasters and gain seven different benefits for the year. Shinagawa has *Shichifukujin* in the two districts of Tokai and Ebara. Here we describe those in Ebara.



Oi-Zao Gongen-jinja Shrine

According to legend, the tengu (long-nosed guardian) of this shrine protected the local community from disaster during the Edo

Period. During the Tengu Festival in April, a portable shrine bearing the *tengu*'s face is carried around.

Tokoji Temple

Within a hall in this temple's grounds, Ususama Daimyouou is honored as the deity named Tosu that purifies toilets. Honoring this god reportedly prevents diseases of the lower part of the body.

Yogyokuin Nyoraiji Temple

This temple has five statues of Buddha known as "the Great Buddhas of Oi." The temple is popular for the beautiful natural scenery it offers during each season. Location: 5-22-25 Nishi-Oi







Kami-Shinmei Tenso-jinja Shrine (Hebikubo-jinja Shrine)

During a great drought in 1322, people prayed to Ryujin (the dragon god) for rain. This Tenso-jinja Shrine, which honors Ryujin and Shirohebi (the white snake god), was built to show their gratitude for the gift of rain they received.

This temple is related to the Minamoto clan, who developed the mountain during the Kamakura Period. In the neighboring area is a trace of an ancient place name remaining, "Genji-mae."

Queen Maya, the mother of Buddha, is enshrined in Maya Hall. Many visitors also come to Mayaji Temple for its Buddha's birthday festival, which takes place every May.
