Fuji and some of the oldest stone torii gates in Tokyo. At the Kita-no Tenno-sai Festival held there early every June, the shrine sends *mikoshi* (portable Shinto shrines) out into the city streets, which are lined with visitors.

Itagaki Taisuke was a politician active between the end of the Edo Period and the Meiji Era who led the Freedom and People's Rights Movement. Next to his grave is a stone monument

bearing his famous cry, "Itagaki may die, but freedom shall never die!"

Large Tokoname Ware Jar

This large jar, found in Gotenyama, is believed to

have been produced in the early fifteenth century in what is now Tokoname City, Aichi Prefecture. It was made

using the coiling technique, in which rope-like rings of clay are stacked on top of each other. Jars such as this one were typically transported to Shinagawa by sea. Similar large jars have also been discovered in the Tama River basin area, including in Fuchu City and Hachioji City.

To Incoming Municipal Elementary or Junior High School or Compulsory Education School Students: Coming Soon—Notification Postcards about Which School They Will Enter

Notification postcards stating the schools that children will enter are scheduled to be sent out late December to households with children starting school in April 2025. Please contact the School Affairs Section if any of the following apply to you:

- Your children will be entering a school other than a Shinagawa municipal school (national or private school, etc.)
- The notification has an error in your child's name, address, date of birth, parent's/ guardian's name or other information
- You and your children are scheduled to move either within Shinagawa City or out of the city

Notes:

- 1. Children who have had a school entrance consultation may be mailed a notification in late December or later.
- 2. The notification will not be mailed to families with children who are currently

in compulsory education school and will be promoted to the seventh grade in the same school.

If either of the following apply to you, and you have not yet completed the designated procedures, please do so at the School Affairs Section right away.

- Your child is of foreign nationality and you want him/her to enter a municipal school
- Your child is of foreign nationality and will graduate from an elementary school in March 2025 and you want him/her to enter a municipal junior high school/ compulsory education school.
